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Reading Part

22 questions = 22 points??

This part focuses on the participant's ability to

- understand gist, the overall message of the text and its main points, details, attitudes, text structure
- scan the text to find specific information
- separate relevant information from irrelevant
- deduce opinion not directly stated in the text
- infer meaning from context



Task types

1. <u>Multiple matching (Task 4 in the test)</u> provides the opportunity for the participant to read such types of text as, for example, advertisements and match them to the statements/topics.

2. Multiple Choice (Task 5 in the test) is intended to test the participant's ability to understand gist, the main ideas, details and opinions expressed in a text

3. Multiple matching (Task 6 in the test)

In such tasks the participant has to find suitable answers to the questions in several short texts on a common topic.

4. Gap filling (Task 7 in the test)


This method tests the participant's ability to see how a text is structured, analyze the content based on language phenomena and logical connections and involves choosing a strategy of careful, thoughtful reading.

One Man's Goal: To Travel Around the World

Since Erden Eruc left California in a 7-meter-long boat, he has been rowing across the Pacific Ocean, heading for Australia with only birds, fish, and sharks for company. As if that isn't amazing enough, crossing the Pacific is only a part of his journey. Eruc has decided to go all the way around the world using only his own energy. Oh, and his plan includes climbing the tallest peak on six continents along the way. Eruc will row, bike, walk, and climb the world without the help from any motors at all.

Why would he try to complete a difficult goal like this? He explains that he wants to inspire children to dream their dreams and reach their own goals. He wants to show kids that there might be tough parts along the way, and sometimes they might not even reach that final goal. But they can have great adventures and learn a lot along the way.

Eruc has already faced some disappointments and challenges. For example, because he has to row about 10 hours a day, he brought along an MP3 player to listen to music, audiobooks, and study Spanish to pass the time. Unfortunately, the nearly daily tropical rain for several months has forced him to keep his player packed away where it's safe and dry.

Not only that, but wind and waves keep pushing him westward when he wants to go south toward the Solomon Islands. Unlike big ships with powerful engines, his rowboat and arm power are no match for the winds. Fortunately, Eruc has a dry little cabin to crawl into when the daily rowing is done. He can use his little palm computer to connect to the Internet by way of a satellite phone. "For fun, I do emails and phone calls, read, and write in my journal a lot," he says.

Protein bars give him energy, and he boils water to heat freeze-dried beef on a one-burner stove. A solar-powered machine removes salt from ocean water so he can drink it, but only when the sun shines.

He's not bothered by the hard work or even being blown the wrong direction. Eruc sees the world as a laboratory where there is much to learn. For example, when his trip takes him across land, he enjoys meeting people – especially children. He has already visited dozens of schools and shared his story.



Multiple Choice (Task 5 in the test) Tips and Tricks

- *<u>Skim-read</u> the text to catch the <u>general meaning</u>
- *Read the questions and answer options, underline the key words in them.
- *<u>Scan-read</u> the texts for the words or phrases which <u>match</u> the words or phrases in the questions.
- *If you cannot determine the correct answer, use the elimination method.
- *If the phrase in the question <u>repeats</u> a phrase from the text, then most likely this is a <u>trap</u>, and this answer will be <u>incorrect</u>.
- *Of the four options provided only one contains a key which is the best answer to the question. The rest are <u>distractors</u> that are plausible but incorrect answers to the question – they are there to 'distract' your attention from the correct answer by being very similar to it.



Skimming

is when you look over a text quickly to get the <u>general idea</u> of it. You don't need to read every word - just pick out key words and sentences.

Scanning

is when you look over a text quickly, <u>line by line</u>, <u>hunting</u> for key words, dates, names <u>and numbers</u>.

Gap filling (Task 7 in the test)

This method tests the participant's ability to see how a text is structured, analyze the content based on language phenomena and logical connections and involves choosing a strategy of careful, thoughtful reading.

Gap filling (Task 7 in the test)

- * Read the entire text, ignoring the gaps. For each option, try to predict what information is needed (time, place, action, description, etc.).
- * Check that the selected answer and the right place in the text match: the tense of the verb, different pronouns etc.
- * If two options are grammatically suitable, then we pay attention to the context, the lexical meaning of the words and the sentences before and after the inserted one.
- * Reread the text with gaps already inserted and make sure that all sentences fit together logically and grammatically.
- * Determine how much the extra options do not fit all the gaps.

Top Tips

- Ignore anything you already know about the topic and don't make assumptions. Base your answers on the text only.
- Remember that you are matching meaning, not words.
- Manage your time carefully.
